FALL 2023 PRE-KINDERGARTEN CORNER







We also started reading with our buddies, the Pre-K's!:)










Grade 5's started on a program that allows them to be a news reporter, an anthropologist, a mathematician and a scientist.



Music News

Mrs Jackson, PK-6 Fall 2023



Hello everyone! It's wonderful to be back at St. Joseph the Worker school for my second year. It's great to work with all the staff and students again! In September we began music classes with a quick start, and continued from where we left off before summer holidays.

In September, we began the Orff instrument rotation with all the barred instruments (xylophones, metallophones and glockenspiels) travelling through the upper Wing, and in October they were taken to the grade 1 and 2 classes.

Guitar in Gr 6

All our grade 6 students can tune most of the strings on their own guitars! Woot Woot!

This saves so much time, allowing them to practice on their own and learn to play songs together on the first two strings!





Grades 3, 4 & 5

We started off in September playing and arranging songs using the Orff Instruments. Students had a variety different instruments at their tables to rotate around, ensuring that each student had a chance to play each part.

Then in October, to Warm up their rhythm sense, we played a traditional game, adapted for music class. They wore rhythms on their foreheads, and went around the room clapping each other's rhythms until they found someone who sounded like theirs! Take a look at the grade 4's pictured here.

Grades I & 2

In October, both classes began learning the important skills of playing together and aiming for the same notes. For some students this was their first opportunity to use xylophones and metallophones. Their excitment was tough to contain, so we did alot of experimenting, and unguided playing alternating with skill building exercises. This included one of the most important things - stopping and starting together! Students were set up with a partner at the instruments and took turns with their classmates on the 6 instruments pictured here.




Students wrote their Terry Fox dedication letter and posted. They were excited posting their letters!


Health Updates

Activities

We have started health by introducing self-esteem, self-concepts, and self-identity to our students for grades 4 - 6 and creating short and long-term goals for our Grade 3. For our younger kids, we started by introducing personal hygiene and healthy practices and having activities to emphasize that physical activity is better for their health.

OCTOBER 2023

Our Grade 5 and Grade 6 are set to have a presentation this November to showcase the result of their research to their fellow St. Joseph the Worker School students. They created presentations for a product line of their choice. They will also be showing presentations of different dental practices and services to our younger students to help them take care of their teeth.



For the Month of October, We started focusing on giving the student different activities enhancing their manipulative skills like throwing, kicking, bouncing, rolling, etc. We started doing initial assessments for running by doing a sprint and for jumping by doing a standing long jump. We took good records of running and jumping from the students!







Our Grade 3 - 6 are doing handball and speedball as part of their skill development sport enhancing their manipulative skills and even other skills like balance coordination. Younger kids are now starting to play cooperative and fun organized games that involve throwing, catching, and striking. More games and activities awaits them this coming Winter!
